NJ Aid for Animals is the 911 for animals in New Jersey. When people are frustrated and have called everyone else and can get no response, they call us (even our phone number ends in 911) because we are always there.

There for dogs like Sweet Pea left for dead and Maggie who would have been put to sleep. *There* to spay and neuter 70 pit bulls who are so badly abused and maligned. *There* to vaccinate almost 400 animals from Camden. *There* when a dog that is forced to live outside needs a doghouse. *There* when citizens have no transportation to get their animal fixed. *There* to answer myriad phone calls and emails from people all over the State of NJ who need help with resources or questions about animals. NJ Aid for Animals is the 911 when all other resources have failed. We are *there* because of your support.

SWEET PEA

As a "bait dog", Sweet Pea was a helpless victim abused by a dogfighting operation to train fighting dogs to main or kill their opponents. On April 13, when she became injured, she was abandoned at a garbage dump in Camden City, NJ.

Left at a local shelter for five days in excruciating pain until we found her, she was rushed to the hospital where she stayed in intensive care. Her vet said Sweet Pea was "one of the worst bait dog survivors" she had ever seen.

For days, Sweet Pea endured having her bandages being changed and covered in salve. Like a burn victim, Sweet Pea was in so much pain but she never became aggressive.



"Pea" then went through rehabilitation with NJ Aid for Animals swimming every day and gaining back her strength. Although she lost her entire ear and endured puncture wounds on her entire upper body, she recovered like a miracle and was soon lifting herself up on our pool ladder.

The wonderful Ms. Sweet Pea even has a fund named after her. With the money we had left over for donations for her care, we started a fund at Mount Laurel Animal Hospital in her name and have been able to help dogs and cats that have come from Camden that were abused and abandoned like her. With those funds dwindling now, won't you help us to help more animals in 2016 like Sweet Pea who had no advocate?





70 PIT BULLS FIXED IN CUMBERLAND COUNTY

When NJ Aid for Animals was offered a chance to have Mike Trout pose for a billboard for us to spay and neuter pit bulls in Cumberland County (the poorest county in New Jersey with a poverty rate of 17.5%) , we knew we had hit a home run.

With our billboards sponsored, the fabulous Mike Trout posing and a private donor granting the funds to fix the dogs, we were able to spay and neuter seventy (pls put in red) pit bulls who otherwise would be mating and filling already overflowing shelters in the surrounding areas.

We organized all the logistics, screening calls from people who wanted to get their pit bulls fixed. The program has run out of funding but NJ Aid for Animals can be there AGAIN for the Mike Trout Pit Bull Spay Neuter Program with your generous donations.



NATIONAL DOG BITE PREVENTION WEEK

Our mantra is Advocacy. Action. Impact. One of our favorite yearly programs promoting advocacy is during national Dog Bite Prevention week in May.



Every year 4.7 million people in the United States are bitten by dogs with children and elderly the most common victims. Surprisingly, the vast majority of these bites are not cause by "vicious" dog attacks but during every day interactions with family pets. The good news is that many of these bites are preventable.

NJ Aid for Animals, the leader in innovative ideas to promote the health and safety of dogs, hosts Jim Crosby, world-renowned canine aggression specialist, to visit New Jersey. We take him to other rescues, fosters, animal shelters and vets so we can educate dog handlers so no one gets bitten. Once a bite is landed by a dog the dog has now been 'labeled'. Educating professionals who handle dogs on a daily basis saves humans and dogs.

MAGGIE MAY

In latter part of 2014, this pup scared and fearful was eating and urinating where she laid under a bed in Camden, NJ, one of the most violent cities in America. She was then given to someone in Sicklerville, NJ who didn't care for her shyness and let her go in the woods. When NJ Aid for Animals found out we set out to capture her.

Maggie was thin and starving, covered in ticks and flinched when we touched her. When we caught her she was so "pancaked" (a term used for animals that are so fearful they plaster themselves against any surface) there was almost no hope. We had no resources, trainer or behaviorist in the area that had ever seen such a fearful puppy. She wouldn't even stand up to eat or go outside to potty.

NJ Aid for Animals was fortunate to find a special partner in North Jersey who took on Maggie to work with her. Early part of 2015, we were told even they held no hope she was just so shut down.

Then Maggie May had a major breakthrough. She started playing with other dogs, actually soliciting human touch. It was a miracle even they were shocked.

In May, 2015 appropriate with her name, Maggie May was adopted. Maggie is living in a beautiful carriage house in New Hope, PA with a wonderful woman enjoying the sun, other dogs, humans and yes butterflies.



PETS IN THE CITY VACCINE CLINIC

For almost a decade, NJ Aid for Animals has been taking lifesaving vaccines to Camden, NJ to underserved residents and whose animals' suffer without the benefit of vaccines. Parvo the often fatal virus which rears its ugly head in hot weather and unsanitary conditions affects the very young puppies and old dogs much like swine flu is to humans the very young and old suffer. NJ Aid for Animals' fund raises all year to be able to offer this vital service. At the same time, we are able to sign people up to have their animals fixed and transport them through our Fetch Fix and Return program

In 2015, NJ Aid for Animals broke all records for having the most dogs and cats at one venue on one day of 38





cats and 348 dogs. People lined up two hours before the event started to take advantage of this opportunity. At no time in history of Camden, one of the most violent cities in America, was there ever more animals gathered for such a good cause and NJ Aid for Animals made it happen!

GLORIA, GRETA AND GEORGE

NJ Aid for Animals is the 911 that acts as a first responder getting to Camden whatever the time of day in exigent circumstances. Gloria had just given birth to two babies in a house where an individual we have been helping for a decade tries to save cats from the mean streets of Camden. Throughout the years, we have helped this individual with dozens of cats getting them fixed, providing vet care and food.

In 2015 we found Gloria hiding in a bookcase where she had just delivered two kittens. Gloria was very sick yet still trying to nurse her precious babies.

We scooped them up, got vet care for Gloria and she and her kittens went to a rescue partner where they were put up for adoption. Helping people help animals feels good.
